<b>DATABASE</b>	<b>WHAT IS IT? (SELECTING SOURCE TYPE)</b>	<b>URL</b>
<b>AMERICAN HISTORY ONLINE</b>	<p>Select <b>Reference Source</b> for <b>most</b> (but not all) of the articles. There are <b>also news articles (Reuters), images, videos, maps, and charts</b> in the database. For a <b>Timeline</b>, select <b>Original Content in Database</b> because the timelines were created for this database. If there is <b>no book title</b> under Record Information (<b>From:</b> is not one of the lines), select <b>Original Content in Database</b>.</p> <p>You need to look in multiple places to make sure you locate all of the source information. Check the <b>blue Citation link</b> (under the article title) <b>and the Record Information</b> to the right (always use the updated year if there is one given). <b>Also click on the book title (next to From:)</b>—there may be <b>additional information</b> (e.g., series name or editor) on the Source Information page. If no publisher is given, enter Facts on File.</p>	Copy Record URL at the bottom of the page.
<b>ANCIENT AND MEDIEVAL HISTORY ONLINE</b>	<p>Select <b>Reference Source</b> for <b>most</b> (but not all) of the articles. There are <b>also news articles (Reuters), images, videos, maps, and charts</b> in the database. For a <b>Timeline</b>, select <b>Original Content in Database</b> because the timelines were created for this database. If there is <b>no book title</b> under Record Information (<b>From:</b> is not one of the lines), select <b>Original Content in Database</b>.</p> <p>You need to look in multiple places to make sure you locate all of the source information. Check the <b>blue Citation link</b> (under the article title) <b>and the Record Information</b> to the right (always use the updated year if there is one given). <b>Also click on the book title (next to From:)</b>—there may be <b>additional information</b> (e.g., series name or editor) on the Source Information page. If no publisher is given, enter Facts on File.</p>	Copy Record URL at the bottom of the page.
<b>BRITANNICA IMAGE QUEST</b>	Select <b>Photo or Illustration</b> . Artist's name and library, research institution, or collection owner are usually listed under Credit.	Click on Cite. Copy the yellow URL.
<b>BRITANNICA SCHOOL</b>	<p>Most articles used from this database will be the encyclopedia articles. Select <b>Original Content in Database</b> for articles under the Article tab. When entering the source information in NoodleTools, check the database citation (checkmark icon) for the publication date.</p> <p>Select <b>Magazine</b> for articles under the Magazines tab.</p> <p>If you select an <b>article that takes you to a different website</b> (e.g., one of the articles under “News from New York Times” or any of the sites under “Web’s Best Sites”), answer “Where is it?” with <b>Website (not Database)</b>. <i>Britannica School</i> is <u>not</u> included in the citation.</p>	Copy from the address box.
<b>CLASSROOM VIDEO ON DEMAND</b>	Select <b>Film or Video Recording</b> .	Click on Embed/Copy (under the title) then click on Copy.
<b>CQ RESEARCHER</b>	Select <b>Magazine</b> for the weekly <i>CQ Researcher</i> reports. The database name and magazine name are the same <u>unless</u> you’re using an older report (one published before 1991). For those older reports, <i>Editorial Research Reports</i> is the magazine name given in the database citation at the end of the article.	Copy Document URL at the bottom of the page.
<b>CURRENT BIOGRAPHY ILLUSTRATED</b>	Select <b>Reference Source</b> (or select Photo or Illustration if you’re using a photograph). The reference source title is <i>Current Biography</i> ; the database name is <i>Current Biography Illustrated</i> .  <i>Current Biography</i> articles from 1940-2009 can also be found in print in the reference section.	Copy the Permalink URL (in the column to the right of the article).

DATABASE	WHAT IS IT? (SELECTING SOURCE TYPE)	URL
<b>FERGUSON'S CAREER GUIDANCE CENTER</b>	Select <b>Reference Source</b> (there are also some videos). The reference book title is on the <u>search results screen</u> (it does <u>NOT</u> appear on the article screen). The author's name (if given) is in the database citation. The publisher is Ferguson. The publication year can be found by going to the bottom of the article screen and clicking on Sources. Scroll through (or use Find) to locate the book title (which is where you will find the year).	Copy Record URL at the bottom of the page.
<b>GALE VIRTUAL REFERENCE LIBRARY</b>	Select <b>Reference Source</b> .	Click on Bookmark (in the black banner at the top of the page). Copy the Bookmark URL.
<b>ISSUES AND CONTROVERSIES</b>	<p>For <b>most articles</b> in this database (including ones described as Encyclopedia), select <b>Original Content in Database</b>.</p> <p>If, however, <b>(Reuters)</b> appears at the beginning of the article, select <b>Newspaper</b> (and enter Reuters as the title of the newspaper). There are also some newspaper articles for which the specific newspaper title is included.</p>	Copy Record URL at the bottom of the page.
<b>LITERATURE RESOURCE CENTER</b>	<p>Search results are divided into content types—<u>NOT</u> source type. (The content type can be changed in the column to the right.) On the article screen, <b>look at the source information provided below the article title</b> to determine the original source. <b>When entering the source information</b> in NoodleTools, <b>check both the information given below the article title and the database citation</b> under Citation Tools in the column to the right.</p> <p>If the <b>source line</b> under the article title has a <b>publisher and just a year or if "Rpt. in" is on that source line</b>, <b>Reference Source</b> is most likely the correct choice.</p> <p>If the <b>date</b> in a source line is <b>more than just a year</b>, the source type is most likely <b>Journal, Magazine, or Newspaper</b>. If a configuration like this—56.3 (Summer 2014)—is in the source line, select Journal (56 is the volume; 3 is the issue). If there aren't two numbers (like 56.3) <u>before</u> the date, the source is most likely either <b>Newspaper or Magazine</b>.</p> <p>There <b>may be other citation types</b> in your search results (e.g., transcripts from radio shows like <i>Talk of the Nation</i>)—clicking on the publication title may help you determine what it is, but ask for help if you're not sure what to select. If there is a <b>link to a website with no actual article</b>, go to that site. Answer “Where is it?” with <b>Website</b> (<u>not</u> Database). <i>Literature Resource Center</i> is <u>not</u> included in the citation.</p>	Click on Bookmark (in the black banner at the top of the page). Copy the Bookmark URL.
<b>MODERN WORLD HISTORY ONLINE</b>	<p>Select <b>Reference Source</b> for <b>most</b> (but not all) of the articles. There are <b>also news articles (Reuters), images, videos, maps, and charts</b> in the database. For a <b>Timeline</b>, select <b>Original Content in Database</b> because the timelines were created for this database. If there is <b>no book title</b> under Record Information (<b>From:</b> is <b>not</b> one of the lines), select <b>Original Content in Database</b>.</p> <p>You need to look in multiple places to make sure you locate all of the source information. Check the <b>blue Citation link</b> (under the article title) <b>and</b> the <b>Record Information</b> to the right (always use the updated year if there is one given). <b>Also click on the book title (next to From:)</b>—there may be <b>additional information</b> (e.g., series name or editor) on the Source Information page. If no publisher is given, enter Facts on File.</p>	Copy Record URL at the bottom of the page.

DATABASE	WHAT IS IT? (SELECTING SOURCE TYPE)	URL
<b>NOVELIST PLUS</b>	Select <b>Review</b> . On the next screen, select Journal, Magazine, or Newspaper (the source in which the review originally appeared). Each book review in a <i>NoveList</i> entry should be entered into <i>NoodleTools</i> as a separate citation.	Copy the Persistent Link to This Record (inside a box above the reviews).
<b>OPPOSING VIEWPOINTS IN CONTEXT</b>	<p><b>For many articles, answer “What is it?” with the section name (Reference, Magazines, Newspapers, etc.). <u>Exceptions are:</u></b></p> <p>1) <b>Viewpoints</b> (these are articles from the <i>At Issue</i> and <i>Opposing Viewpoints</i> books that originally appeared in newspapers, books, etc. and were reprinted in a collection)—select <b>Anthology/Collection</b>. Look at the end of the database citation (<u>after</u> the URL) for “originally published.” If the original format was a book, journal, magazine, or newspaper, select that format in the “Was your source originally published in” box. If the original source was anything other than one of those four (e.g., a speech), there is no original information to enter other than the year in the “year specific work was originally authored or published” box.</p> <p>2) <b>Statistics</b>—select <b>Original Content in Database or Reference Source</b> (check the database citation to determine which one of these to choose).</p> <p>3) <b>Biographies</b>—select <b>Reference Source</b>.</p> <p>4) <b>Websites</b>—go to that site. Answer “Where is it?” with <b>Website (not Database)</b>. <i>Opposing Viewpoints in Context</i> is <u>not</u> included in the citation.</p>	Click on Bookmark (in the black banner at the top of the page). Click on Select then copy the link.
<b>PROFESSIONAL COLLECTION</b>	<p>Only one source type appears in the initial search results (the top of the results list will indicate which type of source is being displayed). To view articles from the other source types, select one of them from the Content Types column to the right.</p> <p>(Be aware that this is <u>not</u> a full-text-only database—there may be citation-only entries in the search results.)</p>	Click on Bookmark (in the black banner at the top of the page). Copy the Bookmark URL.
<b>PROQUEST CENTRAL K12</b>	<p>Select <b>Journal, Magazine, or Newspaper</b> for <u>most</u> of the articles in this database. To verify the citation type, move your cursor over the icon to the left of the article title on the search results screen.</p> <p>There are numbers like this—50.6—before the dates for many of the articles in this database. Those numbers <u>are</u> entered in <i>NoodleTools</i> for journal articles (50 is the volume; 6 is the issue); they are <u>not</u> entered for magazine articles.</p>	Copy from the address box.
<b>SIRS ISSUES RESEARCHER</b>	<p><b>Identified by icons to the left of the article summaries (Newspapers, Magazines, etc.) <u>except:</u></b></p> <p>1) <b>Topic Overview / Timeline / At Issue</b>—all of these were written specifically for this database. Select <b>Original Content in Database</b>.</p> <p>2) <b>Reference</b>—there are articles under this heading for which the citation type is <u>not</u> reference source. Ask for help.</p> <p>3) <b>Viewpoints</b>—some of these are from magazines; some are from newspapers.</p> <p>4) <b>Websites</b>— go to that site. Answer “Where is it?” with <b>Website (not Database)</b>. <i>SIRS</i> is <u>not</u> included in the citation. (#5 for <i>SIRS Issues Researcher</i> is on the back)</p>	Copy from the address box.

DATABASE	WHAT IS IT? (SELECTING SOURCE TYPE)	URL
STUDENT RESOURCES IN CONTEXT	<p>5) <b>Multimedia/Statistics</b>—click on the title of the article from which the chart, graph, etc. came. Use that article's source information for the citation.</p> <p><b>For most articles, answer “What is it?” with the section name (Reference, Magazines, Newspapers, etc.). <u>Exceptions are:</u></b></p> <p>1) If an article is in the Reference section but has a line with source information that looks like that article originally appeared in a newspaper, journal, etc., the article probably needs to be entered the same way as the Viewpoints articles in the <i>Opposing Viewpoints in Context</i> database. <b>Ask for help if you think you have one of these but aren’t sure what to do.</b></p> <p>2) If <i>Gale Student Resources in Context</i> appears in the location where there would normally be a book title (i.e., there is <u>no book title given</u>), the article was written <u>for</u> this database—it never appeared anywhere else. (These are usually found only in the Reference section.) Select <b>Original Content in Database</b>. Do <u>not</u>, however, select this if there is nothing more than a link to an external free-web site. In that case, see #6–Websites.</p> <p>3) <b>Biographies</b>—select <b>Reference Source</b> for most articles in this section.</p> <p>4) <b>Primary Sources / Creative Works</b>—some (but not all) of these are reprinted articles that should be entered as Anthology/Collection.</p> <p>5) <b>Featured Content / Critical Essays</b>—a mix of source types can appear under these headings. Ask if you’re having difficulty determining the source type.</p> <p>6) <b>Websites</b>—go <u>to</u> that site. Answer “Where is it?” with <b>Website (not Database)</b>. <i>Student Resources in Context</i> is <u>not</u> included in the citation.</p>	Click on Bookmark (in the black banner at the top of the page). Click on Select then copy the link.
TEEN HEALTH AND WELLNESS	Select <b>Original Content in Database</b> .	Copy from the address box.
